Ist Annual Innovations Fair by Linda Lyle, Retiring Superintendent

On April 26th at the Albuquerque campus, and on April 28th at the Alamogordo campus, NMSBVI held its first annual Innovations Fair. A direct result of the department's strategic plan, the event's goal was to showcase the remarkable, creative work of NMSBVI staff. The Fair was set up similarly to a science fair, and staff shared information about twenty-seven different initiatives at the school. The displays ranged from an update on current and planned capital projects on the Alamogordo campus... to a Language Arts class which has opened the world to students through book sharing discussions with students in Canada.

One popular display was hosted by Datha Peters, NMS-BVI Life Skills instructor, who shared three-dimensional games that were developed by Life Skills staff and are used as part of instruction to help students learn the complexity of adult independence and decision-making. The ECP staff shared early results from their Neuro Imaging Vision Impairment (NIVI) research project as well as early Braille literacy strategies and ideas related to the Expanded Core Curriculum (ECC) for young children. Low Vision Clinic adaptations highlighted the increased information that is available to families when educators and doctors are able to work together. The Infant Toddler Program reminded those attending the Fair that abuse continues to break families apart and to cause irreparable damage to our children. They also demonstrated the value of reflective supervision as well as the many ways videotaping can be used to document progress in a child and to provide a venue for collaborating and reflecting on one's work.

Perhaps the most important outcome of the Fair occurred in the thinking of participants who visited the displays. Many expressed amazement at the breadth of the school and its involvement in developing strategies and products in the field of blindness education. For many staff, though, it triggered ideas; helped them realize that they, too, had something unique to offer to the field; and perhaps planted a spark to motivate them to be ready to participate in next year's event!

Diagnostic Taskforce by Julie Johnson, Outreach Coordinator

NMSBVI partnered with teachers of students with visual impairments (TSVIs) and diagnosticians from around the state to create a unique and vital training to help diagnosticians know the best way to proceed when they need to evaluate a student with a visual impairment or blindness. The exceptionality of visual impairment, including blindness, is a low incidence disability and makes up less than 1% of the population. Therefore, many diagnosticians will see very few students with visual impairments in their careers. These students each have unique learning needs, and it is very important that evaluations, used to help make decisions around eligibility in the various disability categories, are done with appropriate accommodations and modifications.

The presenters are Jennifer Tierney, TSVI and certified orientation and mobility specialist for Las Cruces Public Schools and Sheila Thornton, TSVI and diagnostician for Lovington Municipal Schools. The training stresses the importance of



collaboration between the diagnostician and the TSVI before testing takes place. It also stresses the importance of the TSVI completing a functional vision evaluation and learning media assessment before the diagnostician tests the student. Sheila also provides specific information about the tools that diagnosticians use to help guide them in choosing appropriate assessments. The training was presented in three locations: Roswell, Las Cruces and Rio Rancho. Close to one hundred people from around the state attended these trainings. The next step is to put the video, power point presentation and frequently asked questions online so that the information will be available whenever someone needs it. Dr. Sandra Lewis presented on "Expanded Core Curriculum" and there were also breakout sessions for Orientation and Mobility as well as Assistive Technology for Academic and ISP students. The conference was well-received by professionals, parents, and students, and there was excitement that NMAER is once again a viable professional organization in New Mexico. NMVI Count Database by Mary Vaughn, IRC Coordinator

Orders for 2017-2018 have started coming in; and the Instructional Resource Center (IRC) at NMSBVI is excited to send them out to districts and students throughout the state! This is all possible through the American Printing House (APH) Quota Fund. Funds are allocated based on a national census of students who meet the federal definition of blindness, have an educational program that meets the guidelines, and have a written educational plan (IFSP or IEP).

NMVI Count is the new web-based database system that districts will use to register eligible students for APH. After a district ensures that their students meet certain requirements, they'll register them through the database. Once a student is registered, the district has access to APH resources including Braille and large print textbooks, as well as other specialized equipment used by students with visual impairments. Those students who don't qualify for APH, still have access to materials because they are covered through provisions under IDEA; instead of APH, they are registered through the Supplemental Registry.

B-3 Feeding Research Project by Luanne Stordahl, Developmental Vision Specialist

The NMSBVI Birth-to-Three Program was fortunate to be chosen this year to participate in a mealtime routines research project through the University of Northern Colorado, in order to learn more about how to help our littlest NMSBVI learners to develop their feeding skills. The purpose of this project is to develop an intervention that trains providers to work with families on positive mealtime routines for infants and toddlers with severe visual impairments. Staff took part in a week long training in Colorado to learn about the development of feeding skills, fine motor and oral motor skills, growth, social-emotional interaction, parent learning styles, and routines-based intervention. Monthly assessments and videos are uploaded to the researchers who will gather information about the development of the child's feeding skills, growth, and parent confidence with mealtime routines. At the conclusion of this study, researchers will develop a family-centered intervention – the Mealtime Routines for Visual Impairment Intervention (MRVI) – to support infants & toddlers with visual impairments in gaining independent mealtime skills.


